# TAUBE TENNIS CENTER

The Taube Tennis Center hosted the first-ever combined men's and women's NCAA Tennis Championships in 2006. In addition, it has hosted the women's championship four times. The facility boasts 17 outdoor courts, all with championship lighting. It is the home of the nationally acclaimed East Palo Alto Tennis and Tutoring Program. The Taube Family Tennis Stadium has served as the host site for the Fed Cup Finals in 1999 and the Siebel Champions Tour in 2000 and 2001. Since 1997, the Stadium has been home to the Bank of the West Classic, which has featured Martina Hingis, Mary Pierce, Lindsay Davenport, Venus Williams, Justin Henin-Hardenne and Kim Clijsters.

# TAUBE TENNIS CENTER

## The Initial Stadium Improvement

The **Ralph Rodriguez Clubhouse**, built in 1983, became the cornerstone of the facility upgrade. It provides meeting rooms and coaching staff office space. It also houses the **Orsak Family Heritage Room**, featuring one of the most impressive displays of collegiate success in any sport in the nation. In 1989, the old bleacher-type seating was demolished, and a beautiful 1,200 individual seat stadium was erected. The **Taube Family Tennis Stadium** was named as a 1990 "Facility of the Year." This structure contains men and women's team locker rooms, additional office space, and an indoor practice range, formally named **The Ralph Rodriguez Founders' Room**.

The **Craig R. Johnson Players' Lounge**, donated by the former 1976 standout and his family, is a popular team gathering place and study area.

In 1996, the **Russ and Jackie Thompson Video Center** was added, courtesy of Jackie Thompson in memory of her husband. This trend-setting video center has been updated by **Michael Boskin**, and features video feeds from cameras mounted on seven courts. Players and coaches can review each practice and all matches either in the Video Center, or by a review of individual CDs.

## The Facility Today

Thanks to the lead generosity of Tad and Dianne Taube, as well as over 1,300 other former players and supporters, **The Taube Family Tennis Stadium** was completed in the spring of 1997. It now features 2500 individual seats, a championship Plexicushion indoor court and substantial office space. **The Koret and Fluegel Family Conference Rooms** are an important component of the building and are serviced by a kitchenette, restrooms and substantial storage space.

In 1999, the **Phil and Penny Knight Scoreboard** was erected allowing for live updated scoring for all eleven courts for the stadium and the internet. **The Victor and Gwen Riches Family Tutorial Rooms**, home of the East Palo Alto Tennis and Tutoring Program, lighting for all eleven courts, and the **Bill and Dixie Gates Heritage Plaza** soon were added.

The 2004 addition of the \$3 million **Taube South Complex** was spearheaded by the impetus afforded by Tad and Diane Taube, Mike and Shirley Orsak, the Craig Johnson family and John Arillaga. The U.S. Tennis Court and Track Builders Association named it the "Outstanding Outdoor Tennis Facility" in recognition of excellence in design and construction. The Taube South complex features six lighted courts, a scoreboard and permanent spectator seating.

The Taube South Complex was named the U.S. Tennis Court and Track Builders Tennis Facility Award in 2003.

In 2005, permanent bleachers seating over 200 were added to the competitive courts outside the Taube Family Tennis Stadium. Now, all 17 Taube Tennis Center courts have spectator viewing. Also added was a wireless system allowing umpires to relay the score of any of the 17 courts directly to the Phil and Penny Knight scoreboard, and from there to tennis website at [www.gostanford.com](http://www.gostanford.com). The viewer clicks on "Live Scoreboard" to follow the individual match score from a replica of the scoreboard. Further, the viewer may select a live video stream from any match being played on courts one through six.

### Buck/Cardinal Club: Stanford Scholarship Funding

In June of 1934, the "Tiny Buck of the Month Club" was formed to raise the necessary funds from Stanford alumni and friends to pay the tuition costs for capable, worthy and needy student-athletes. As the Club's name implied, membership dues were one dollar per month and the word "tiny" was added to emphasize the modest amount and to honor head football coach, Claude "Tiny" Thornhill. The Club later shortened its name to the "Stanford Buck Club" and revised its initial membership dues requirement.



Until the mid-1970s, there were no athletic scholarships for women, nor was there any fundraising organization devoted to this purpose. To accomplish the task of raising scholarship funds for women, the Cardinal Club was formed in 1977-78.

Under the guidance of the Buck and Cardinal Club leadership, a merged Buck/Cardinal Club was formed in 1987 to raise funds for both men's and women's athletic scholarships. The new volunteer organization was built on the fine Buck and Cardinal Club traditions that served both organizations well.

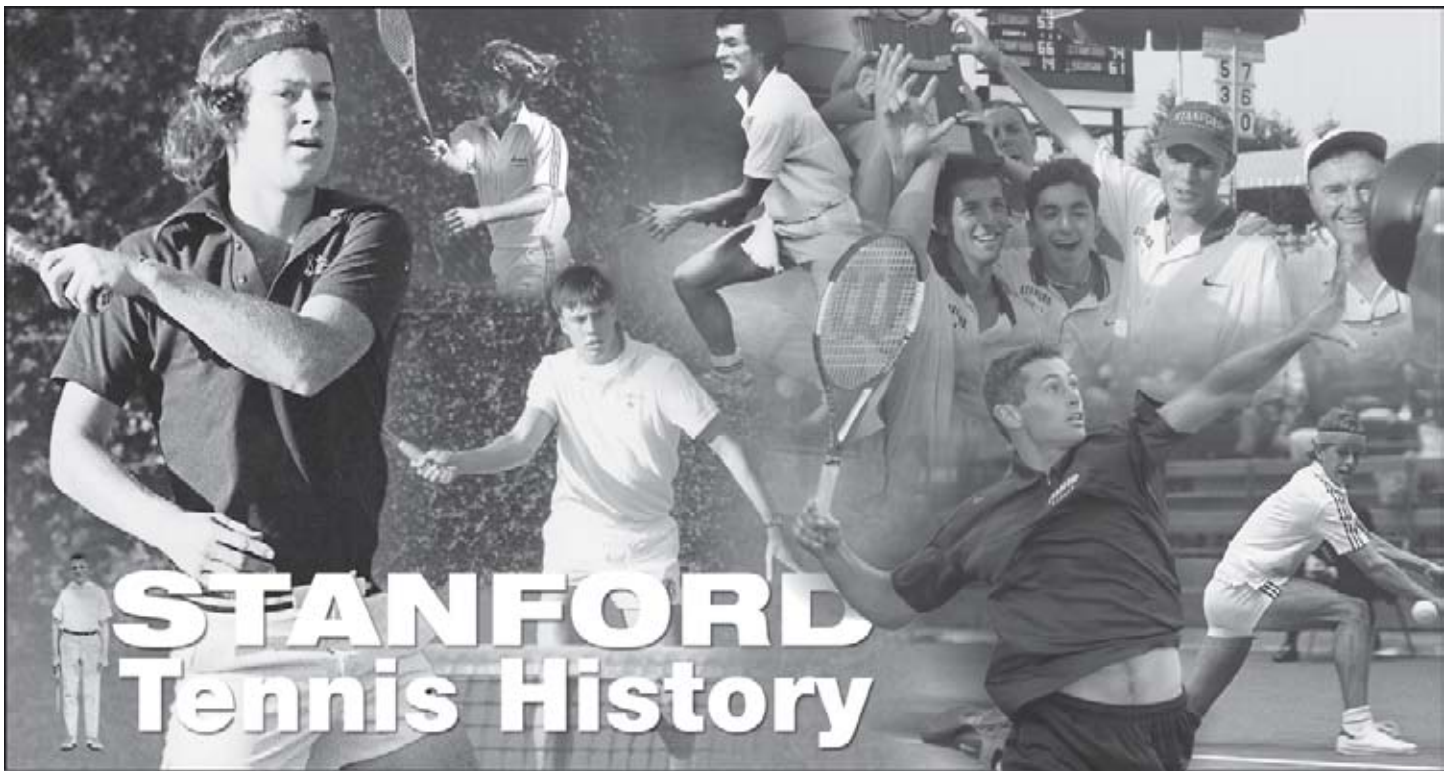
In 2007, the Stanford Athletic Department provided full operating budgets to all 35 varsity sports. These budgets include all of the components necessary for our programs to compete at the Division I level. Because of this, none of our varsity sports will be required to fundraise for their basic operating budgets effective fiscal year 2008 (September 1, 2007).

These new budgets will be funded in large part by a more robust Buck/Cardinal Club, enabling our head coaches and their staffs to focus their time and energy on coaching and recruiting instead of fundraising for basic operating budgets. Our donors will receive Buck/Cardinal Club benefits commensurate with their generosity.

Under the new Stanford Athletics annual giving program, the Buck/Cardinal Club will not only include its great scholarship tradition, but also assist the department's coaches and staff in providing the resources needed to compete at the highest level of NCAA Division I athletics.

Instead of receiving solicitations from individual sports, donors and friends of Stanford Athletics will now receive a single solicitation from the Buck/Cardinal Club. By giving a gift to the Buck/Cardinal Club, the donor is giving both their favorite sport, and all of Stanford's varsity sports, the budget resources they need. Donors will also have the opportunity to let us know which sports are their favorites at the time of the donation, and sports will keep in touch with donors who specify interest in that specific program.

Since Phil Neer (left) won his first title in 1921, Stanford has helped change the face of collegiate tennis. John McEnroe captured the 1978 NCAA singles title while leading Stanford to the team title. McEnroe became one of the most decorated players on the Pro Tour, capturing an amazing 17 singles and doubles Majors titles. Tim Mayotte won the 1978 NCAA singles title and went on to a world #7 pro ranking, as did Alex (Sandy) Mayer, who was a singles and two-time NCAA doubles champ. Jared Palmer captured the 1991 NCAA singles title and went on to score Majors titles in doubles and mixed doubles. The team celebrates the 1998 team title (upper right), led by Bob Bryan, who captured the NCAA singles title and teamed with brother Mike to capture the doubles title. The Bryans are currently the top doubles team on the professional tour.

Matt Mitchell (above) won the 1977 NCAA singles title and helped lead Stanford to its first NCAA title in the current six singles/three doubles format.

Stanford University's tennis program has been the finest in the collegiate ranks for three decades. Coupled with unmatched team records in recent years, individual successes have also flourished under the tutelage of Director of Tennis Dick Gould and current head coach John Whitlinger. Scores of former Stanford players abound in the professional ranks.

### Stanford Tennis History

Stanford University's tennis program has steadily developed into the premier program in the United States. Beginning with Phil Neer's national intercollegiate singles title in 1921, the next two decades saw Stanford amass 10 collegiate individual championships. In addition, Lin Murray, John Doeg and Ted Schroeder and John McEnroe each captured the U.S. National Championships.

Stanford's men's and women's teams have won 33 team titles in the past 34 years – 17 men's and 16 women's. Either of Stanford's tennis teams has won more collegiate titles by itself than all other men's and women's teams combined since 1973.

### Men Dominate Collegiate Tennis with 17 Championships

Stanford's men claimed NCAA team titles in 1973-74, '77-78, '80-81, '83, '86, '88-90, '92, '95-98 and 2000 to dominate collegiate tennis in that time period. A remarkable note is that any player who competed for Stanford during any four-year period from 1969-2003 has at least one NCAA Championship ring to his credit. Since the NCAA initiated its team championship playoff in 1977, Stanford has won 15 of the 31 tournaments held and finished second twice. In 28 national championship appearances, the Cardinal has racked up an unbelievable 92-13 (.876) dual match record.

Stanford now holds 17 national championship titles (UCLA and USC are in second place with 16). The Cardinal's 13 singles championships since 1921 is second on the all-time list, while its 14 doubles titles ranks third.

### Men's Tennis Professionals

Since 1993, eight different Stanford men have represented the United States in Davis Cup play. They include: David Wheaton 1993, Jim Grabb 1993, Patrick McEnroe 1993, '94, '96 (Captain 2001-07), Jared Palmer 1994-95, 2000-02, Jonathan Stark 1994, '95, '97, Alex O'Brien 1997, 1999-2000, and Bob and Mike Bryan 2003-07. Eight have participated in the Summer Olympics dating back to 1984 (Derrick Rostagno 1984, Tim Mayotte 1988, Jeff Tarango 2000, Palmer 2000, O'Brien 2000, Bob Bryan 2004, Mike Bryan 2004, and Patrick McEnroe as coach in 2004).

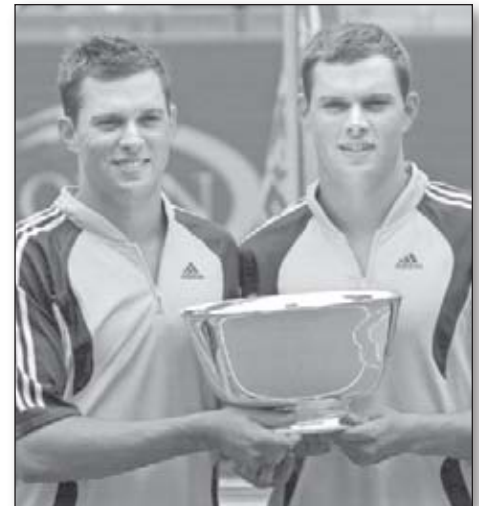
Dan Goldie (left) captured the 1986 NCAA title while guiding Stanford to the team title. Alex O'Brien (top) won the NCAA singles, doubles and team title in 1992, and went on to star on the Davis Cup and U.S. Olympic teams while also capturing a pair of doubles Majors titles. Ryan Wolters (bottom left) teamed with K.J. Hippensteel (top right) to win the 1999 NCAA doubles title. Jonathon Stark (bottom right) was a NCAA doubles finalist with Jared Palmer in 1991. Stark went on to capture the 1994 French Open Doubles title, earned a world #1 doubles ranking, and represented the U.S. Davis Cup team in 1994, '95 and '97.

Mike (left) and Bob Bryan with the 2005 U.S. Open Men's Doubles Championship Trophy – This former 1998 NCAA Championship doubles tandem (Bob also won the singles title) won the French Open Doubles title in 2003. They completed the career Grand Slam by adding the Australian Open and Wimbledon titles in 2006. Since 2003, they have been consistently ranked as the World's #1 doubles team. They have won several Grand Slam mixed doubles championships – the U.S. Open (Mike in 2002, Bob in 2003, 2004 and 2006), and the French Open (Mike in 2003). Bob serves on the ATP Tour "Player Council." The Bryan brothers led the United States to its first Davis Cup win in 12 years over Russia in December 2007, under the direction of captain Patrick McEnroe. This Davis Cup doubles team resides in Camarillo, CA.

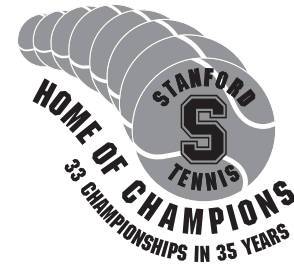
The following Cardinal players achieved or matched personal high world rankings in 2007: In singles (five) Matt Bruch (648), Alex Clayton (940), Ted Kelly (1501), James Pade (629) and Sam Warburg (146); In doubles (nine) – Bob Bryan (1), Mike Bryan (1), Matt Bruch (1279), Paul Goldstein (40), Kevin Kaiser (1596), Scott Lipsky (58), David Martin (62), James Pade (698) and Sam Warburg (117).

Some interesting statistics achieved in the Open Era (beginning 1968) are as follows:

- In 1982, eight former Stanford players reached at least the round of 32 at Wimbledon. Also, in 1982 10 former Stanford players were ranked among the world's top 100, four of them in the top 10.
- Six former Stanford players have reached at least the semifinals of Wimbledon, four of whom were in at least the quarterfinals in 1983.
- Nine former Stanford players have reached the world's top 15 in singles and 14 have reached the world's top 10 in doubles, including seven at No. 1. Most recent attainees of the top ranking include Alex O'Brien (No. 1 in 2000) and Jared Palmer (No. 1 in 2000, '02), and Bob and Mike Bryan (No. 1 in '03-07).

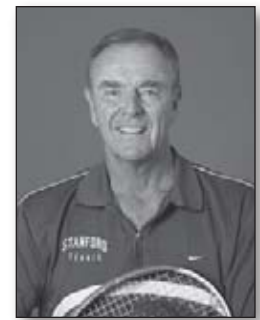

John Whitlinger, a two-time All-American at Stanford, who has established himself as one of the nation's top collegiate coaches, is in his fourth season as Head Coach of the Cardinal after serving 18 seasons as the associate to Dick Gould. Whitlinger took over the Head Coaching duties in 2005 from Gould, who assumed the position of Director of Tennis for the university.

Under the tutelage of the pair over an 18 period (1987-2004), the Cardinal posted a 396-58 (.872) record and claimed nine NCAA team titles.

"I am honored to be the head coach at Stanford," said Whitlinger. "I hope to maintain the excellence that Coach Gould started over 40 years ago. I have learned so much from him as a player and as his assistant coach. I am forever grateful for all he has done for me. He has been an incredible friend and mentor. We have formed a great team here at Stanford and I'm thrilled that he is still be a part of the program as the Director of Tennis."

Whitlinger directed the Cardinal to a 14-11 record in 2005, then saw his team show marked improvement with an 18-4 overall record in 2006, advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championship and went 6-1 in winning a share of the Pac-10 title. Whitlinger was honored by his peers as the 2006 Pac-10 Coach of the Year. Last year's team struggled through injuries to finish 8-16.

One of the nation's top teaching professionals, Whitlinger is co-director of the famous Stanford Tennis School. He was awarded the inaugural National ITA Assistant Coach of the Year in 1997 and was inducted into the ITA Collegiate Hall of Fame in 1999 and the Fox River Valley (Wisconsin) Tennis Hall of Fame in 1998.

"John has been instrumental in helping Stanford continue its national success," said Gould. "We are blessed to have a coach of John's caliber associated with Stanford. He is without question one of the top coaches in the world."

As an athlete, Whitlinger helped lead Stanford to its first two NCAA Championships in men's tennis in 1973 and 1974. In 1974, he won the NCAA Singles Championship, teamed with Jim Delaney to win the NCAA Doubles Championship, and helped lead Stanford to the NCAA Team Championship. Whitlinger, a member of Stanford's Athletic Hall of Fame, earned All-America honors in 1974 and 1975.

After his collegiate career, Whitlinger was an international touring professional for six years and was ranked among the top 50 in the world in singles and top 40 in doubles. He also played for the Indiana Loves of the World Team Tennis League. He now teams up with 23-year old son J.J., and the duo have been ranked as high as No. 3 in the nation in the National Father-Son Rankings.

In 2002 and 2003, they won the prestigious Agawam Hunt Club Tournament in Providence, Rhode Island, and were quarterfinalists at the National Grass Court Championships in Brookline, Massachusetts and at the National Clay Court in Cincinnati, Ohio.

From 1981 to 1986, Whitlinger was a head professional at the Racquet Club at Harper's Point in Cincinnati, Ohio. He ranked in the top five in men's singles play in the United States Professional Teaching Association (USPTA) – the national association of teaching professionals.

The Whitlinger family was named the National Tennis Family of the Year in 1986. Whitlinger's father, Warren, who celebrated his 93rd birthday this year, has coached numerous junior tennis players in Wisconsin and currently works with players on the mental aspects of the game. His sister Wendy is the Director of Tennis at Fox Cities Racquet Club in Appleton, Wisconsin. Whitlinger's sister-in-law, Ruth, manages the club and his brother Kip has coached tennis at the high school level in Menasha, Wisconsin. His nieces, Teri and Tami, both attended Stanford and currently reside in Tampa. Teri captured the 1990 NCAA Doubles Championship, and Tami was ranked among the world's top-40 players as a professional. Both spent time as teaching professionals following their playing careers.

Whitlinger, a native of Neenah, Wisconsin, came to Stanford in 1972 as one of the top junior players in the country. During his high school career, Whitlinger won an amazing 109 consecutive matches en route to four straight state singles championships (1969-72). He holds 11 National Junior Titles, including the 1971 Interscholastic Championship and the prestigious International Orange Bowl Championship in 1969 and 1970. He was also a member of the U.S. Junior Davis Cup teams from 1970-74.

Whitlinger and his wife of 27 years, Jan, have two children: 24-year old son, J.J., who graduated from Saint Mary's College in 2005 and is currently teaching pro at the Fremont Hills Country Club as well as a third year assistant coach on the Cardinal, and 22-year old daughter, Claire, who recently graduated from George Washington University and is now a graduate student studying sociology at the University of Michigan.

"I am very excited to have Brandon as part of the coaching staff," said men's tennis coach John Whitlinger. "He is a very accomplished player and coach at all levels of the game. He is very respected throughout the tennis community."

"I have been thinking of coaching at the college level since my professional career concluded," said Coupe. "Like a lot of people, I have always had tremendous respect for Stanford players and coaches, both on and off the court. I now look forward to coaching some of the most outstanding student-athletes in the world. I thank Coach Whitlinger and Stanford for the opportunity," he said.

Coupe joined the Tiburon Peninsula Club in 2001 and became the Head Professional in 2003. He was also a professional coach from 2004 to 2006 and the Tournament Director of the Esurance Tiburon International Tennis Challenger in 2003 until 2004.

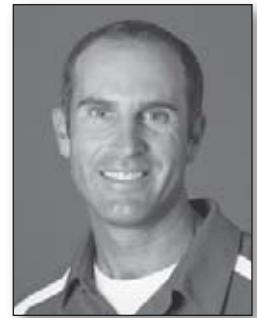
From 1994 to 2003, Coupe played on the ATP Tour and participated in 14 Grand Slam events, including the 2002 U.S. Open where he was a quarterfinalist. During his professional career he played with and against some of the world's greatest players, including Roger Federer, Andy Roddick, James Blake, Andre Agassi, Lleyton Hewitt and Boris Becker. Coupe achieved an individual doubles ranking of 61 in 1999 and teamed with Mark Merklein to rank in the top-20 that year.

In addition to playing on the ATP Tour, Coupe coached a number of top-100 players on the pro tour, including in 2004 when he mentored Justin Gimelstob to the third round at Wimbledon.

Coupe played at San Jose State from 1990 until 1994 under the tutelage of respected coach John Hubbell. As a senior, he earned All-America honors and received the National Von Nostrum Most Improved Player award and the Raphael Ossuna Senior Player of the Year award. Coupe was also named All-Conference in the Big West all four years. As a freshman, he played No. 2 singles for San Jose State, losing only four matches during the year and winning the regional Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship Award. Over his next three seasons, Coupe played No. 1 singles and doubles and holds the school record for most victories. He was a three-time NCAA Championship competitor and a semifinalist at the 1994 NCAA Indoor Championship.

A native of Granite Bay, Calif., Coupe began playing tennis at the age of 10 and entered a number of junior tournaments, including the Kalamazoo National Tournament. In the U-18 division he was ranked as high as No. 35 in the country.

Coupe currently resides in Mill Valley with Natalie, his wife of six years, and their four-year-old son Max.

**J.J.** Whitlinger, son of Cardinal head men's tennis coach John Whitlinger, is in his third season as a Volunteer Assistant Coach for the men's tennis program. The younger Whitlinger is a recent graduate of Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif., where he was a four-year member of the Gael's tennis program.

J.J., which stands for John, Jr., earned a bachelor's degree in Politics from Saint Mary's in June, 2005. He was an All-Conference doubles player, team captain as a senior and the team's Most Inspirational Player as a sophomore and junior.

He attended Menlo-Atherton High School before attending Saint Mary's. J.J. was a four-time First-Team All-Pacific Athletic League selection, two time league champion (singles as a senior and doubles as a freshman), four-time team MVP and three-year team captain. He also led his team to the Central Coast Section championships on two occasions. As a senior, J.J. earned all-conference honors in football as a wide receiver and return specialist and was named his high school's Male Athlete of the Year.

The Whitlingers played together as a father-son doubles team and were ranked as high as No. 3 in the country a few years ago. John, Sr., of course, is a former NCAA singles and doubles champion for Stanford who took over for Dick Gould as the team's head coach in 2005.

## STANFORD TENNIS 2008 OUTLOOK

The 2006-07 season would have been an acceptable campaign for many teams. Matt Bruch won the Pac-10 Championships as a sophomore for the second year in a row, and the Cardinal posted some impressive wins such as a 4-3 victory over No. 26 Miami at the National Team Indoor Championships in Chicago, IL. But the team suffered its first losing season in 37 years and was without an All-American for the first time in 38 years. For a program that has the most championships in college tennis and for a head coach who has won 11 NCAA titles as a coach and player, 2007 – a year marred by injuries – was a season to build on.

This year a star-studded recruiting class and the return of many top players to the squad mean the Cardinal can return to the limelight.

“This team could surprise some people. We’ve got a lot of talent,” says head coach John Whitlinger. Stanford returns two-time Pac-10 champion and last year’s No. 1 Matt Bruch, whose injuries last year forced him to miss over half of the team’s dual matches. Also returning this year is sophomore Richard Wire, who went 10-4 as the team’s No. 1 after stepping into that role midway through the year. Despite last year’s success, coach Whitlinger looks for more out of Wire. “I think Richard could have

a breakout year this year,” says Whitlinger. “He works tremendously hard and keeps getting better everyday.”

Wire is one of three Stanford players appearing in the ITA’s preseason rankings. The doubles team of Bruch and Blake Muller is ranked second, while in singles Bruch is the high man at No. 36, followed by Wire at No. 48 and freshman Alex Clayton at No. 111.

Clayton leads a highly-touted freshman class that will augment last year’s squad, and this fall’s impressive results have only shown a glimpse of how good this class could be.

“I think Alex will be a major force in college tennis this year,” says coach Whitlinger. And before you pass that comment off as hyperbole, note Clayton’s quarterfinals appearance at the All-American Championships and semifinals finish at the ITA National Indoor

Championships. Or look at Clayton’s 9-2 mark against nationally ranked opponents, with his only two losses coming against the No. 1 and No. 4 ranked players in college.

However, Clayton is hardly the only freshman who will make an impact on this year’s squad. Ted Kelly lost only one match in two years as the No. 1 for his high school team and finished the Under-16 division ranked as high as No. 20. This fall Kelly won the ITA Northwest Regionals doubles tournament with Muller and advanced to the ITA Indoor Championships. As a singles player, he defeated the top seed and No. 14 Pierre Mouillon of California at the tournament. Greg Hirshman, the team’s final freshman, made it into the doubles finals with Wire at the ITA Northwest regionals and has gone 5-4 as a singles player.

With such a young squad (all of this year’s players could potentially return next year) Whitlinger believes the biggest challenge this team will face is getting the young players used to college tennis and competing at this level. But the coach believes this team’s greatest asset, its toughness, will be the difference. “Are we the most talented team in the country?” Whitlinger asks. “Maybe not. But we can be the toughest.”

### The Schedule

Stanford will face some immediate tests entering the new year.

“Our schedule starts off with a bang,” says Whitlinger. “It’s very exciting and filled with opportunity.” Stanford opens up by going to Tulsa to face defending national champion Georgia and a solid Tulsa squad. “Playing in Tulsa, where the NCAA Championships will be held, will give us some experience in the venue,” says Whitlinger.

Following the Tulsa trip, the Cardinal comes home to face perennial Pac-10 contenders UCLA and USC. “The

Feb 22 and a match against California the following day. Stanford will also face non-conference foes Brown and Saint Mary's at the Taube Tennis Center.

The challenging schedule figures to play to Stanford's advantage when they participate in the spring tournaments. On Feb. 29, the Cardinal travels to La Jolla, Calif. to play in the Pacific Coast Doubles tournament and on April 24 for the Pac-10 Individual Championships. The NCAA Tournament begins May 9 at campus sites with first round action.

**Singles**

With many of the top singles players returning from last year and a new group of talented freshman entering the fold, the competition will be strong for the top six spots. "This is a deeper team than we've had in a while," says Whitlinger. "You've got to like the healthy competition that we are going to have."

Stanford returns 76-percent of its dual match points played last year. Among the returns are the primary Nos. 1, 2 and 3 players from last year: Bruch, Wire and Muller. "Muller is a breakout candidate this year," says

home schedule is excellent," says Whitlinger. "The Pac-10 will be very strong this year."

In addition to the Los Angeles schools, Stanford will face Baylor, an opponent the Cardinal has yet to beat in the history of the program, along with Hawai'i and BYU in a five-match home stand beginning Feb. 2. Other home matches include a meeting against Boise State on

Whitlinger, "He has a ton of talent. Everybody made contributions last year, and I could see the same thing happening this year."

The deep Cardinal squad will also allow for strong practices throughout the year. "In years past, our teams have had good competition for playing time and this

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year I see us having that good competition again," says Whitlinger. "It has the potential to be a very deep singles lineup."

Last year five different players held down the No. 5 and 6 roles, and this year figures to be no different. "Our good teams in the past have had strong lineups top to bottom, and I can see us having that again this year," says Whitlinger. Partially contributing to last year's shuffling among the roles were the injuries to many Cardinal players. But with a healthy fall, Whitlinger hopes those worries are behind them.

The Cardinal loses graduating seniors Eric McKean and David Ryan from last year's squad. McKean played 22 of the 24 dual matches in positions 2-5, and David Ryan played sparingly in the No. 5 and 6 slots. "We lost some great leaders, some team players and very hard workers," says Whitlinger. "We're going to be challenged to replace their leadership and it's tough to see them go."

## Doubles

"Doubles is very important," stresses Whitlinger. "We are going to be playing a lot of close matches this year, and winning that doubles point means you only have to win three of the singles matches instead of four. That's huge."

Fortunately for the Cardinal, this year they look to be very solid at doubles. Besides Bruch and Muller being ranked as the second best tandem in the country, the Cardinal showed its strength at the ITA Northwest Regional by making the doubles final an all-Stanford affair. Despite the success of the doubles squads so far, the teams this year are still in flux. "The doubles teams are a work in progress," says Whitlinger. "We have a lot of very good players, and now it's just a matter of figuring out who plays together the best." Stanford returns two of its primary doubles teams from last year. The No. 1 squad of Bruch and Muller, who went 16-3 overall last year, will return along with the primary No. 2 squad of Wire and Paul Morrissey. McKean was Stanford's primary No. 3 player last year, playing with junior Jeff Zeller and sophomore Kevin Kaiser in that role. "I think we are going to be very good in doubles this year," says Whitlinger.

With the top teams returning with another year of experience and talented players waiting to contribute, it's easy to agree with the coach.

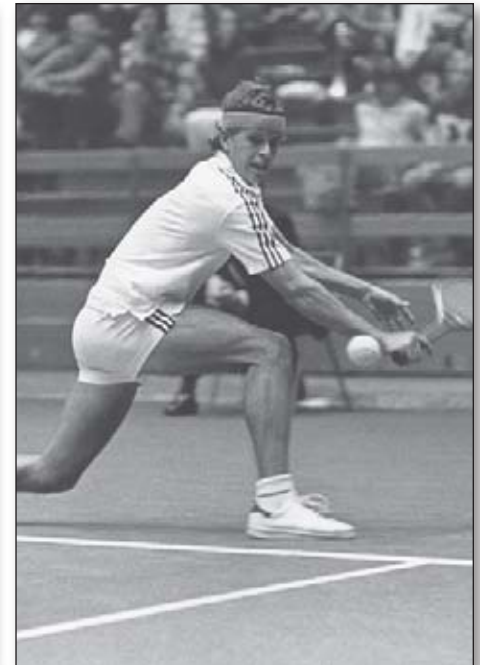
John McEnroe – The 1978 NCAA singles champion has been ranked #1 in the world in singles and doubles on numerous occasions. He was a star performer in the Davis Cup for many years and served as team captain in 1999-2000. He was inducted into the International Tennis Hall of fame in 1999, the intercollegiate Hall of Fame in 1996 and the Stanford Hall of Fame in 1997. His bestseller, *You Cannot Be Serious?*, was published in 2002, and he continues to be one of the world's premier television tennis commentators. He resides in New York City with his wife and children.



Nick Saviano – '77; BS – '03 (Barry University). This two-time All American was a nine-year tour veteran. He served as a USTA National Coach and as the Director of Coaching and Coaching Education from 1988-2003. He has written numerous acclaimed instructional articles, and his book, *Maximum Tennis*, was published in 2003. Nick and his family live in Davie, Fla., and he directs the Saviano High Performance Tennis Academy.



Jared Palmer – '93. Jared was the NCAA Singles Champion in 1991, attained the world's No. 1 doubles ranking in both 2000 and 2002, represented the U.S. in the Olympic Games and the Davis Cup, and earned the Wimbledon doubles title in 2001. Jared and his wife have residences in Palo Alto and Sweden. Jared was inducted into the Collegiate Tennis Hall of Fame in Spring 2006.



Matt Mitchell – '79. This 1977 NCAA singles champion also led the team to victory in the first true team NCAA championship. He and his wife live in New York City, and his company, *Classic Tennis*, combines tennis education and personal training. He was inducted into the Collegiate Tennis Hall of Fame in 2006.

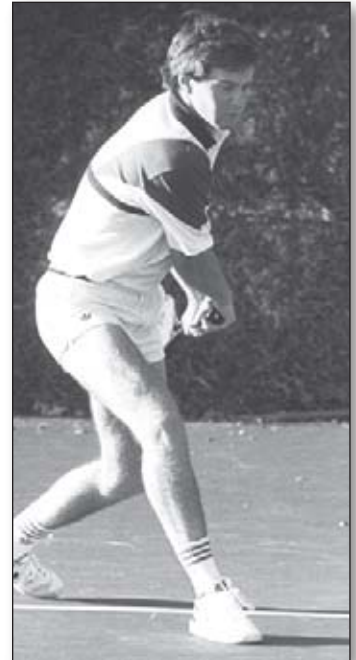

Tim lives in New York City, where he is a teaching professional and presenter at numerous tennis conferences.*

Alex O'Brien - '92. Alex is a rare NCAA triple crown winner - singles, doubles and team (1992). He went on to win the U.S. Open Doubles championship and attained a #1 world doubles ranking.
